- **CT scanning & "Muscle Bus"** Lincoln University now has a new operator for the CT scanner. Does the Society wish to continue with the scanning programme? Price will stay at \$100 per ram scanned. Following discussion the Council is in favour of continuing with the "Muscle Bus". To co-ordinate: T Abraham – North Island, G Smith – South Island. It was agreed there is a need to publicise the scanning more to members and try and increase to numbers of rams being scanned.

# **REPORTS TO COUNCIL**

President's Report to Council. Lincoln University. November 2012.

Since our May meeting a number of Council initiatives have been progressed.

The success of two of these initiatives is largely due to the efforts of one Councilor and I would like to begin my report by acknowledging Kate Broadbent and the work she has achieved since May. In the short time Kate has been on Council she has achieved

a great deal and on behalf of Coopworth Genetics New Zealand I would like to formally express our gratitude and commend her work.

Thanks to Kate our new web site is up and running and has refreshed our public appearance as desired. It is a positive step forward in the promotion and communication of our breed and I hope it will continue to evolve as a tool for our Society – a tangible asset for the members. It is up to us now to keep it current and interesting by supplying new photos and items of interest.

Kate has also been instrumental in the development of the FE Gold "Brand" in conjunction with AgResearch. Since introducing the concept at our last meeting Kate has become a steering committee member of a mixed breed group that has established criteria for identifying leaders in facial eczema genetics, and protecting their investment. Being able to launch the brand logo in time for advertising in October's Heartland Sheep was a significant achievement and one that a number of our North Island breeders will stand to benefit from - this season.

It was very pleasing to see the number of Coopworth breeders recognized in the Beef + Lamb / SIL awards, and in particular members of our Council. My congratulations go to Edward Dinger for winning three of the dual-purpose Top Flock classes and gaining commendation in a fourth – an outstanding performance. Also to Steve Wynn-Harris and Kate Broadbent for their commendations in the Dual Purpose Top Flock traits and Steve for winning the Super Sire high performance and meat yield categories. It is reassuring to see the dominance of our breed in this assessment of dual-purpose genetic merit.

Jon & Karen Gilkinson of Morton Mains Farm In Wyndham won the Coopworth section of the 2012 NZ Ewe Hogget competition. Kingsley Clark attended the awards dinner and presented the Coopworth tray to the Gilkinsons on our behalf.

I have recently had discussions with Kingsley. He has indicated that he is not seeking to renew his contract as Secretary / Treasurer. In order to promote a smooth succession of the secretarial role it has been proposed that Kingsley work collaboratively with a successor until his term is completed. Alison Hind (known to many of us through her Flock- linc services) has expressed interest in the job and will be discussing the matter further with us. The position of Treasurer will also need to be filled and it is proposed that potential candidates be discussed this meeting so that a suitable person may be approached as soon as possible.

I have received positive feedback about our ads in the Farmers Weekly. I believe further promotion of our name and website is needed still, as a broad search under "Coopworth" without the keyword "Genetics" does not yet select our new site as a priority option for viewing. This should improve with time but I suggest we need to monitor access to the site to indicate how effective it actually is.

I have been approached by the Dominion Post's Jon Morgan to discuss Coopworths and have an interview scheduled for next week.

#### East Coast North Island

An Exceptional 2011 ram selling with most of us selling out at record prices. Then spring then followed by summer and autumn were the best in memory going back 50 years. Coinciding with exceptional lamb schedules and a strong store market led to the best financial year most will ever have. Large tax bills now as a result! Demonstrating well fed sheep express their top genetics. July and August 2012 were very wet (350mm) so early lambs were affected but it has hardly rained since which resulted in record or nearly record lambing %'s. Now there is a shortage of feed and high levels of anxiety. Ram orders are good with those I've spoken to , close to being sold out.

#### Waikato

The Waikato had a beautiful summer, autumn and winter. Ewes tupped in the right condition and subsequent lambing was almost too good to be true. Spring was a different matter with too much rain in September, too dry and to much wind in October and still too cold to shut up paddocks for silage or haymaking in November.

Ram selling went quite well with no protest from the clients for historically high prices, while lamb prices were 20% less than last year. A Hamilton Romney ram sale for FE tested rams averaged \$2250 with the top priced ram going for \$9000 – several went for \$8000.Most dry stock farmers seemed to have accepted that the coming year won't be easy but there is a bit of optimism for the future.

Personally I am disappointed at the lack of publicity that was received with very good showing of the Coopworth breed at the first NZ genetics awards. Not a single inquiry for my rams has resulted from it and generally there appeared to have been little awareness of the awards especially compared with environmental awards, sharemilker of the year etc. only Southland Times had good coverage, first mention in Country-Wide in November

## SOUTHLAND REPORT NOVEMBER 2012

\* The Southland Coopworth Club held an AGM and Dinner at Winton in August. 10 members attended and good discussion was shared over dinner.

\* Farmers in general seem to be tightening their belts to cope with the lower lamb and wool prices.

\* The weather - July and August almost perfect, early September had 3 short nasty showers, otherwise it was okay but October was the wettest October since 1946.

- \* There were more ewe deaths than normal but higher lambing percentages.
- \* A lot of dairy farmers were making silage in early November.
- \* Ram Sales ~ Otago Ram Sale is on the 5th of December 2012

Southland Ram Sale is on the 16th January, 2013.

Regional report . Rangitikei Manawatu

Following a good autumn and lower than usual spore counts, scanning percentages were up. The region experienced reasonable weather for lambing this year, having been very wet in July and early August, things dried out a little by September. With the exception of a couple of storm events the weather behaved although sunshine hours were a bit lacking. October was unusually cold - causing concern about the approaching months. Coastal Rangitikei is currently mapped on Niwa's dreaded red zone for soil moisture.

It appears that greater areas of land are going under the plough this season and sales of prime ewe hoggets (at Feilding sale yards) are also up - not great signs for the local sheep industry. Fortunately ram orders are holding at about the same as recent years.

Prime hoggets made up to \$135 this week at Feilding and good condition ewes made \$110.

In other news, land valuations are down and rates are up!
